Ahh...summer. No school. Shorts and tee shirts instead of sweaters and mittens. Lazy days by the pool. What's not to love? Well, for our horses...plenty!

First, there are the bugs. No horse likes to stand around and be bombarded by flies. They constantly stomp their feet, which can cause leg and hoof problems, and swish their tails, which surely must get tiresome after a while. It can make grazing next to impossible, and horses will often hang out in the shade of a tree where there is nothing to eat, instead of munching the green grass in the sun. And, since we know how much our horses love to eat, we know they must really be unhappy to leave pasture unattended. It leaves us wondering what the best solution is. Fly sprays last for only minutes. Fly sheets cover only so much, and after baking in the sun for a while, horses can get quite hot. Night turnout is generally the answer but there are still issues that complicate this decision.

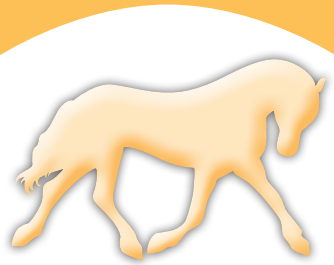
With night turnout the flies are gone but there are still mosquitos. I know I hate seeing huge welts on my horse's belly in the morning, and the threat of West Nile or other disease is a concern. The summer is also plagued by pop-up thunder showers. A tall animal standing on metal shoes makes a pretty good lightening rod. In some areas of our region, we also have to watch out for coyotes. And then there is the stress of just not being able to watch over our animals. What if a fence gets knocked down or a horse rolls and gets his legs stuck? Comfortable in our beds with the air conditioning humming, we may

have no clue until morning that something is amiss. It's enough to give us nightmares.

Summer is also prime horse show season, but there is no shade at X, and galloping cross-country under the noonday sun leaves both horse and human dripping with sweat. Horses, in general, prefer a crisp winter day to the dog days of summer. Their bodies just function better. We, as their caretakers, must have their best interest in mind, even if that means skipping an event we paid good money to attend or sitting out that afternoon ride. If we do deem it okay to work them, we must make sure they cool down, providing plenty of water to drink and hosing them off as necessary. Considering adding electrolytes to their feed or water to encourage them to drink and replenish needed minerals.

And while we're paying such good attention to our horses, let's not forget ourselves. We need to keep hydrated, and heat stroke is a real concern considering how athletic riding is. Watch out for the signs of overheating in yourself, your friends, and fellow competitors (not to mention volunteers and show officials). These include fever and excessive sweating, which then can lead to chills; nausea/vomiting; mental fatigue, which can manifest as confusion, irritability, or lack of focus; and dry mouth that isn't quenched by drinking. And don't forget the sunscreen.

So get out there and enjoy wearing flip flops (just not in the barn) and maybe top off that water bucket while you're at it.

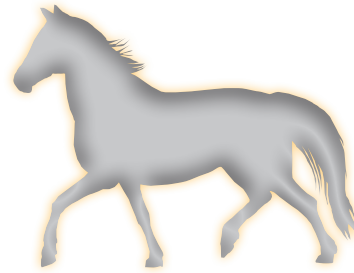

PACKING THE TRAILER

You've got an event coming up. You're an organized person. You know what you and your horse both need to wear and it's all been cleaned. You're ready to go, right? Not quite. You may want to consider a few more items to help things run a little smoother.

Item number 1: clothes for you. Let's start with those white breeches. Odds are pretty good that your horse is going to happily grind a mouthful of yummy grass into a lovely bubble of slime. Being the gentleman that he is, he'll want to keep a clean kisser and you'll make the perfect napkin. Protect those jods by wearing a layer on top. Oversized capri's work well. Are you sure you'll be wearing your dressage jacket? The weather may turn so hot that jackets are excused. Be sure that you have an appropriate top. It must have sleeves and a collar. No tanks or tees. Then for the other extreme. Do you have a suitable rain jacket? You don't want to show in anything that is not conservative, is bulky, or flapping about to the point of distraction. Tack stores have see-through rain jackets designed to be worn directly over hunt coats. Speaking of rain, if you get wet during your dressage test, you'll be stuck in those wet breeches for a couple of hours unless you've packed a spare pair. Plan an outfit for walking your stadium and cross country courses. No, you are not trying to look like you should be modeling on a Paris runway. However, riding boots are usually not that friendly to feet on long strolls over varying terrain. Sneakers often get wet due to water crossings or damp grass. Paddock boots may be a good choice, but you may find having a spare pair of socks a welcome treasure. If the weather is cool enough for a jacket, select one with a zipper. A pull on hoodie type is all or nothing and may not be a good choice as you warm up on your walk. Don't forget the sunscreen. When your competitive day is over, you'll feel more refreshed if you can change into something clean and comfortable, so pack accordingly.

Item number 2: clothes for your horse. Horses generate quite a lot of body heat. If you are showing during

blanket season, choose a light sheet for traveling. In any season, coming off cross country, your horse is likely to be sweaty and need a rinsing. Have a knit sheet available. Summer is fly season. Your horse may spend hours standing in the trailer. He may stomp quite a bit as the local insects try to make a meal out of him. A fly sheet, fly boots and fly spray will allow him to relax during the day.

Item number 3: tack. A back-up halter is a must. Go shopping in your basement and put a spare bridle together. If you have a spare with you, you're not going to need it. If you don't, chances are good that your horse will somehow stand on and break the reins or the metal buckle on the nose band will fatigue and break. Stirrup leathers also have a tendency to break at the most inopportune time, such as during warm-up. Keep an extra by your spare bridle.

Item number 4: performance equipment. Most events have now adopted the format that the competitors go to cross-country directly from stadium. Horse and rider usually wear cross-country attire. However, cross-country horse boots are generally very protective, and Dobbin may get a bit sloppy in stadium if he learns that brushing the rails is no bother. Consider using boots that are more appropriate for stadium jumping. Change to a more protective model prior to heading out to cross-country. Draw string nylon bags, like those found in stores that sell sneakers, are perfect for carrying boots to the jumping areas. They're also handy for carrying water bottles or a copy of the omnibus that includes the dressage test. Studs can be quite useful, but they are not benign. Consult with your trainer and farrier prior to using them. Air vests are not required, but they are a worthwhile investment. They provide a layer of protection up to the bottom of the helmet and down to the base of the spine.

A basic first aid kit can limit the consequences of an injury. Nicks and scrapes are not unusual. They can turn into a bigger issue if not promptly

cleaned. Stock your kit with a small bottle of iodine scrub, a sponge reserved for cleaning scrapes, a tube of triple antibiotic ointment, a cutting from a roll of sterile cotton, a disposable cotton leg wrap, safety scissors, and a roll of VetWrap. If that's not enough to meet your needs until you get home, it's probably time to involve the vet. Put the items in zip-lock bags and a plastic container to keep them clean. Water tanks are great, but they may not be adequate in size, especially if it's hot. Five gallon plastic gas type cans are commonly used, but they can be a bit heavy when full. A few well-rinsed gallon containers, as might come from pre-made used tea, can prove quite handy. They're easier to lift and can be used for pouring cooling water directly on a horse that has just completed cross-country.

Item number 4: creature comforts. Nylon camping chairs take up little room and can provide you encouragement to take a few minutes to recharge yourself. Restore your power by having plenty of snacks and drinks available. Consider a camping toilet for your dressing room so that you can skip the joys of the port-a-potties.

Item number 5: help. Most importantly, bring a friend, even if he or she is also competing, they'll provide at least moral support. A teenager from the barn where you ride may enjoy coming along for the learning experience. Throw in lunch and maybe a bit of pocket money and you can have yourself a groom.

At last, there's no sense packing your trailer if you have nowhere to go. Check out the Omnibus. Some activities are organized by ESDCTA others are run by other groups. Upcoming events include cross-country schooling days at the Horse Park of New Jersey, which are on July 1, July 30, and October 13. . The Eventing Championships with open schooling horse trials are scheduled for September 15. ESDCTA will be hosting USEA recognized (most levels) horse trials on October 5 & 6. Levels from starter through preliminary will be available for your enjoyment. Team competition will also be available at the October event. Mark your calendars!

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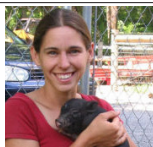
