ESDCTA Statement of Purpose

Eastern States Dressage and Combined Training Association (ESDCTA) was founded in June 1969 and incorporated in 1970 as a nonprofit educational organization under the laws of the State of New Jersey. ESDCTA with membership open to all interested in dressage and combined training, has the following stated purpose: *"Whereas it is the desire among many equestrians in the United States to foster and stimulate interest in dressage and eventing in the hope that this may ultimately benefit the United States Olympic Team in its international competition, this organization is established as a nonprofit educational organization."* Its further purposes are to foster and stimulate interest in dressage and eventing in general, to educate, conduct clinics and hold dressage shows and combined training events.

Introduction to the USEA Xentry Program

As many of you are aware, last year USEA released their online entry program for USEA recognized events: Xentry. For those who tried it last year, some had great success with it, and a few had some issues. USEA has taken the issues seriously, and they have rolled out improvements to the system and they have many enhancements that they plan to roll out during the year.

USEA's main goal is to streamline the experience, so that it's easy to enter and the organizers receive entries quickly. They set a very short list of goals for their first release so that they could focus on accurate and quick delivery of the goals. Xentry was available to riders who were entering themselves, were already USEA members, and their horses were already registered with USEA. They had a flurry of small problems with entries that they quickly resolved as they occurred in 2011.

In 2012, they are looking to better integrate the system on the competition side. They plan to reach out and establish relationships with all of the organizers to understand their needs. Across the US, there are diverse regional nuances in the way that competitions are structured. For example, in 2011, there were 57 different entry fee structures and 42 stabling fee options. To create a system that addresses all of these nuances has been a challenge for the USEA IT team. One of the nice features available now is that when you enter online, the system immediately will tell you what divisions you and your horse are qualified to enter. This can be a handy feature. You can still enter the division if you believe that you will be qualified in time for the competition, but if not being qualified for a division is a surprise to you, then you have plenty of time to contact USEA and find out what you are missing.

Some other features that will be released in 2012 will be allowing nonmembers and unregistered horses to enter (available this month), and allowing a person to enter for someone else. Their ultimate goal is to integrate this with membership, organizer show registration, horse registration, and the omnibus. They are also working toward support for FEI, T3D, and P3D levels. The system is able to provide more robust reporting for the competitions. By the end of the year, they hope to be 100% paperless! **For more information, you can visit the USEA's website at www.useventing.com.**

Announcing the ESDCTA Youth Education Award Program!

The ESDCTA Youth Committee is thrilled to announce our newest program for our youth members - the ESDCTA Youth Education Award Program. This program is designed to broaden equestrian education outside of the competition arena. Youth members through the age of 21 years have the opportunity to be recognized for continuing their education by participating in various programs offered by ESDCTA, USDF, USEA, and other organizations/activities. Assigned credits are earned upon successful completion of activities. There are four levels of recognition within this program: Certificate of Recognition, Prix St. Georges, Intermediare, and Grand Prix. These award levels are cumulative and activities may take place over more than just one year. USDF CONVENTION

This year's USDF annual convention was held in San Diego, California at the Town and Country Resort. I was lucky enough to attend the convention this year along with my mom, Jill Kuc. We flew to San Diego on Tuesday, November 29 and jumped right in on Wednesday, with the Region 1 meeting. Discussions centered on the turnout at different events, such as the Youth Team, GAIG Championships, and CBLM Championships. Dates for various popular shows in 2012 were also provided.

After the Region 1 meeting, my mom and I split. She went to some judge's roundtable meetings, and I attended the Youth Committee Meeting. The meeting was great and seemed to focus on two topics: equitation and youth team competitions. The Equitation Medal Finals is a great way for youth without the fanciest horses to still compete at a national level. The USDF wants equitation to become more popular and is trying to push more people to enter equitation classes. We also talked about the youth team competitions. While some regions have a great turnout, others have little participation. Other regions are thinking about making team competitions into festivals, more similar to Lendon's Youth Dressage Festival, as well as introduce "fun" classes to try to gain participation from other disciplines.

On Friday morning, I was able to attend a youth breakfast. The breakfast was open to youth only and was run by USEF National Youth Coach, Jeremy Steinberg, USEF National Young Dressage Horse Coach, Scott Hassler, USEF Developing Coach, Debbie McDonald, and National Coach, Anne Gibbons. We all got a great breakfast and had the opportunity of speaking with these four wonderful coaches, as well as other youth. I got to meet many youth members from all over the country and hear about all that they've achieved. Many of us, like myself, were there for the awards dinner that would be that night to receive medals. Mr. Steinberg, particularly, gave us a lot of insight into the sport, and all four spoke to us about different connections we now have and of opportunities available to youth. It was great to meet them and hear all of the advice they gave us.

After the breakfast, most of us went to a session with Dr. Jenny Susser, who is a fabulous sports psychologist. The session was targeted for youth members, although a few trainers/parents sat in the back. Dr. Susser spoke to us about having balance in our lives, and how much we, as youth, have uncontrollable pressure from competing, school/work, a social life, etc. All of us were able to understand what everyone else was going through as we're all balancing the same things. After that, Dr. Susser mainly focused on mental imaging and improving our visualization skills to improve our riding/competing. As a group, we did some exercises and then did a visualization of the most important/stressful time of a show – the time from being on deck to when we finally enter the ring. She talked us through it, having us picture ourselves in the warm-up, feeling everything we normally do. Just talking us through it produced a huge difference in what we each felt.

Friday night was the annual Salute Gala/Awards Dinner. Highlights included Lendon Gray being inducted into the Hall of Fame, as well as recognizing our 2011 Pan Am Team and their accomplishments. Looking through the program, many ESDCTA members were receiving medals, freestyle bars, all-breeds awards, and other prizes. Since the convention was in San Diego this year, not many ESDCTA members were there to get their award(s) in person, however there were a few I noticed. Wendy Garfinkel picked up her USDF Silver Medal, an All-Breeds Championship, and Reserve Championship. Merrilyn Griffin also picked up her USDF Bronze and Silver Freestyle Bars. I was lucky enough to have my whole family there supporting me as I got my USDF Bronze Medal and a Reserve Champion All-Breed Award. We also had the support of ESDCTA President, Susan Lax, at the awards dinner, cheering for us all as we got our awards we worked so hard for.

In all, the convention was a great experience for me and I got to meet many fantastic youth riders. Congratulations to all ESDCTA members who received USDF Awards this year.

DIRECTIONS FROM FLEMINGTON CIRCLE:

South on Route 202/31 South. About 3.5 miles from the circle, you will pass Stewart's Root Beer on the right hand side. Copper Hill Road is the second right past Stewart's. Before the traffic light, you will see a sign "Copper Hill Road Keep Right". Veer off onto the jug handle, turn right at the yield sign and follow down the hill. You will see the Clubhouse on your right hand side. To get to the parking lot, go half way around the circle and turn right at the stop sign.

From South Jersey: - Routes 295, 195, or 95 to Route 31 North. Stay on 31 North until it joins with 202 North. Exit onto 202/31 North. Follow approximately 3 miles to light at Copper Hill Road. Take jug-handle on right. Cross 202/31 North onto Copper Hill Road. Follow road up to Clubhouse at top of hill on right.

From North Jersey: - Route 80 East or West to Route 287 South to the Somerville Circle. Follow signs for Route 202 South to Flemington. At the Flemington 202/31 Circle continue halfway around onto Route 202 South. Proceed approximately 3 miles through the traffic light at Stewart's Root Beer. Turn right just before the next light onto Copper-Hill Road. Follow road up to Clubhouse at top of hill on right.

SALUTE!

In Loving Lazelle Knocke

What better way to kick start our new "member spotlight" section then to introduce everyone to one of our Club's founders and a true leader who has helped shape dressage into the sport it is today. Lazelle Knocke.



Mrs. Knocke's commitment to horse sports started well over 50 years ago when she and her husband purchased Hobby Horse Hill in New Jersey. Hobby Horse Hill opened its doors to the U.S. Equestrian Team and the U.S. Pony Club who were in need of a facility to hold their programs. With its indoor arena, outside sand and grass rings, and cross country course, Hobby Horse hosted many clinics with masters like Fritz Stecken, Gunnar Anderson, and Major Dezso Szilagyi, as well as with USET coaches Bertalan de Nemethy, Stephen von Visy, and Colonel Bengt Ljungquist. Our oldest Perpetual Trophy, the Hobby Horse Hill Challenge, actually originates prior to the birth of our organization and was awarded at the Knocke family's annual horse show that benefited the Family Nursing Service. The trophy is now given to the rider with the highest Fourth Level score at our annual ESDCTA Dressage Classic Show.

Mrs. Knocke's riding accomplishments are many—winning her colors as a foxhunter (an honor in that sport), riding through the levels of dressage to Grand Prix, and competing internationally at the FEI levels. In 1991, she earned her USDF Silver Medal. In 1992, she received the USDF Master's Challenge Award at the FEI levels, an award for those who have achieved required scores at age 60 or over. Mrs. Knocke and her dressage partner, Dom Perignon, were the first team members inducted into the Dressage Foundation's Century Club, whose membership is limited to horse and rider pairs with a combined age of 100 able to come down the centerline and perform.

What I love most about Mrs. Knocke is that she just didn't "talk the talk," she truly "walked the walk". Her contributions to the horse sport are so many, as a founder of the Eastern States Dressage Association (ESDA, 1969), currently known as ESDCTA, she helped to put our club on the map and we became one of the 3 founding members of USDF. She was named USDF's first Vice President and served as USDF President from 1989 to 1993. As a USEF and FEI licensed judge, she officiated at many events in the U.S. and Canada over a period of 50 years. Mrs. Knocke was one of the pioneers of the USDF Instructor Certification Program and helped to develop USDF's "L" Education Program for judge training. She has also published numerous dressage articles, and currently serves as a Director Emeritus of the National Board of Directors for The Dressage Foundation.

AND.... somehow she found the time to have a successful nursing career, raise 3 daughters and help out with 4-H and Pony Club!!!

Mrs. Knocke has received many awards in recognition of her unselfish and dedicated efforts. In 1992, she received the USDF Region 1 "Contribution to Dressage" Award. The Chronicle of the Horse named her 1993 "Horseman of the Year" and 1994 "Dressage Horseman of the Year". In 2001, she received the Dressage4Kids "S. Braley Gray Award" that recognizes those who have been instrumental in the development of dressage in the U.S. over the years. In 2002, Mrs. Knocke received the USDF's Lifetime Achievement Award reserved for those individuals who have shown dedication to USDF in their lifetime through volunteerism; to date, there are only 9 individuals who have been awarded this honor.

In 2007, in celebration of her 90th birthday and in recognition of her contribution to ESDCTA, the Club donated \$1,000 in her name to the Dressage Foundation in addition to establishing a Club grant fund to aid adult amateurs and professionals. Each year ESDCTA donates \$2,000 to the fund known as the "Dom Perignon Memorial Grant" named after her dressage partner of many years.

Does it stop here? No! Wanting to leave a legacy to ensure the future development of the sport, Mrs. Knocke generously donated a considerable amount of funds to the Dressage Foundation and has been honored as a "Grand Prix Donor" of the Foundation. The Dressage Foundation website details that the funds she used came from the preservation of Hobby Horse Hill, to keep it safe from "eager developers". Her donation will specifically be used towards "improving the quality of Dressage instruction, judging, and Freestyle riding".



Diane Engler, our Membership Chair, recently asked fellow judges, Ann Forer and Marilyn Payne, what they remembered most about Mrs. Knocke.

Lazelle Knocke accomplishments truly exemplify the term, "giving back" and she is someone that we can all aspire to be. How fortunate we are to have her as a lifetime member.

Remembering Lazelle Knocke

Just over a year ago, Collective Remarks published its first standing column, "Salute." It was the January issue of 2011, and the newsletter committee decided it was fitting that our first Salute should be Lazelle Knocke, cofounder of ESDCTA and USDF. It was with deep sadness that we learned Mrs. Knocke passed away on Christmas day.

On January 8, Mrs. Knocke's family held a beautiful memorial service at the Readington Reformed Church. Family and friends gathered in the pews to hear the pastor's remarks about this incredible woman, successful as an orthopedic nurse, author, equestrian, artist and wife of Frederick and mother of Dorothy Maxwell, Diane Kohout, and Martha Hoffarth.



A display of Mrs. Knocke's photographs, awards, and artwork bordered the sanctuary. The January 2011 Collective Remarks article about Mrs. Knocke was blown up on poster board and led the way to her life story: her family, her husband, her nursing career, the book she and her husband authored, photographs of her riding, her daughters and their mounts, nostalgic moments, and professional events were all recorded.

One by one, people came to the podium to speak about Mrs. Knocke. Stories from her daughters, her friends, and the pastor provided descriptions of the woman whose life exemplified service to so many people in so many fields.

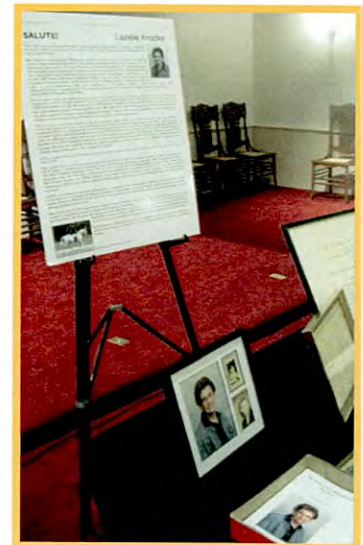
A story about her creativity filled the room with laughter as it was recalled how she entered her daughters in the Sussex County Horse Show parade. The daughters drove their horse cart while dressed in overcoats, hats and gloves in mid-August. Underneath the blanket covering their knees was a cooler of shaven ice. As they past the stands, they threw snowballs at the summer crowd.



Another story related how, at age 88, Mrs. Knocke asked friends to help her ride her beloved "Donny," one more time. Mrs. Knocke's ESDCTA "Don Perignon" Educational Grant is named for Donny. After warming the horse up, her friends turned the reins over to Mrs. Knocke who mounted and had her last ride. A photograph of her that day was on the display.

People sitting in the pews also exchanged stories. Jill Kuc, our Youth Committee Co-chair, told us how her husband Ed was involved in environmental work at the famous Hobby Horse Hill Farm when Mrs. Knocke showed up and introduced herself. He told her that he had just showed that weekend. When she asked him about his test scores and he replied he had not done well, she told him to get the test, which was still in his car and they would discuss it over tea.

While I knew of her many accomplishments and certainly her work for, and her devotion to, ESDCTA and the USDF, I never met Mrs. Knocke personally. I had nothing to share with the people who had come to pay their respects. I gave my sympathies to her daughters and left, glad I had come but sorry I had not ever had the good fortune to meet her. On the drive home, thinking about all I had heard, I realized that I did know Lazelle. As a member of ESDCTA, I see her work everywhere: at Board meetings, at the New Jersey Horse Park during our championship show, or at one of the educational events we host to make sure that our members have every opportunity to improve their horsemanship. I hear Lazelle whenever someone has a new idea and the gumption to follow it through to fruition. I understand what her mission was every time the Board of Trustees has to pass the budget, weeding out what is not needed and fortifying what will nurture our organization and meet the needs of our membership.



If I could have spoken that day, I would have said, "Thank you, Lazelle. You left a legacy to us that we shall protect and grow with you in mind....always."

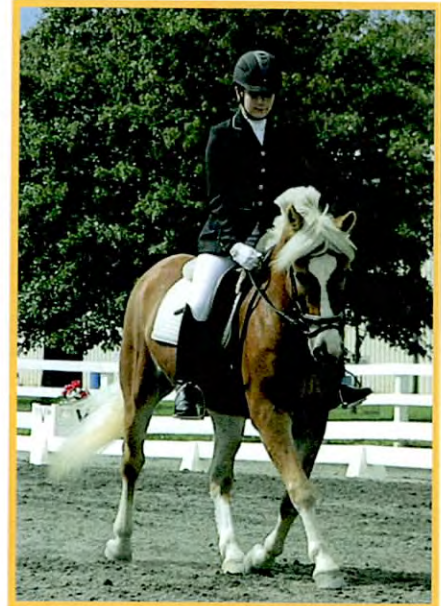
Salute...Jessica Giuliano

HORSETREATS

For a lot of us, the first horse we saw was on the silver screen or on television. But have you ever wondered where those horses came from? Some were well bred, others rescues. Here's the story of a few of those famous horses we know and love.

Mr. Ed's real name was Bamboo Harvester, a Palomino gelding foaled in 1949 in El Monte, California. His sire was a Saddlebred and his mother, a Polish Arabian. Before becoming a television star, he was a show and parade horse, having once been owned by the President of the California Palomino Society. Filmways purchased him for only \$1,500 and the rest is history. Mr. Ed died at the age of 21 from a variety of age-related ailments and was buried at Snodgrass Farm in Oklahoma.



The Black Stallion was played by an Arabian stallion named Cass Ole, who was born in 1969. He had an illustrious show career, winning a National Championship in Western Pleasure, a National Reserve Championship in Ladies Side Saddle, and US Top Ten Arabian English Pleasure, among more than 70 championships and reserve championships. Cass Ole actually had white on his pasterns and a white star, which had to be dyed for the movie. After siring of 130 foals, he was euthanized in 1993 for colic.

Trigger and Buttermilk were the two main horses in the Lone Ranger series. The original Trigger was foaled in 1934, and was a Thoroughbred cross, named Golden Cloud. He had other movie roles before becoming Roy Rogers' famous horse. Buttermilk on the other hand, was saved as a colt from being sold to slaughter by a cattle farmer who named him Taffy. Although he had originally been abused and was nasty, with good care and training he became friendly and affectionate. Glenn Randall, a famous Hollywood trainer saw him at a show and bought him, turning him into Dale Evans' beloved mount. An interesting fact, Roy proposed to Dale while sitting atop of Trigger after a show in Chicago. Trigger was 33 when he died, and Buttermilk died at the age of 31; both of old age.

Hidalgo was played by 5 horses, but the main horse was RH Tecontender or "TJ," a 1993 registered Paint stallion. TJ was found by the famous movie horse trainer, Rex Peterson, who called the American Paint Horse Association to help him find five identically marked Paint horses. Rex spent an afternoon at the APHA headquarters going through the 3.5 million photos of the 700,000 registered Paint horses, and followed up on those he thought would work. TJ had been a show horse in Missouri before being discovered. At the end of filming, the star, Viggo Mortensen, purchased him and still has him today.
