USEA AREA 2 NEWS

Here is a special shout out to the eventing Novice there was a 14.4% decline, but members. I hope everyone had a fun 2012 at Novice it was flat. What really struck season! At the end of the competition me: we had 75% more starters in 2012

season there is always a moment of reflection, and I wondered if eventing is changing in our GMO area. Some results of USEA Area 2 horse trial entries/starters for 2012 were recently shared with the counsel and organizers with some interesting results. The area is up over

2011 (just under 3%). However, entries are down at Beginnner Novice and Novice by approximately 4%. This is after a similar decline at these levels was reported last year. The question came up regarding whether this niche is being filled by schooling/unrecognized horse trials. Could this be true for our GMO area?

I like numbers... so I started doing a little digging into the statistics in our GMO area, which I wanted to share. In our GMO area we have venues that host quality schooling horse trials as an alternative to recognized ones. Combined, these venues had approximately 450 starters at Novice and below levels (including Starter divisions - 2'3" and below divisions). At Novice the number of starters were flat, however, at Beginner Novice we saw a 3% increase. This appears to support the notion that folks are not doing recognized horse trials at this level, and instead are turning to schooling events. At the Starter level the number of rides were also up by 2.9%. Out of the 450 starters at the schooling horse trials, the make up of participants were as follows: Novice 15%, Beginner Novice 30%, and Starter 55%.

We also have three venues that host recognized horse trials in our GMO area. Combined, these venues had approximately 550 starters at Novice and Beginner Novice in 2012. At Beginner



Training level over \mathbf{at} 2011. Most of the change at Training level was at the NJHP HT, when they offered higher-level divisions. Did "big name trainers" or "advanced riders" bring more students or young horses? Some may argue that eventers no longer ride without their trainer at

2011 (just under 3%). However, entries are an event. I don't know the answer, but down at Beginnner Novice and Novice by wanted to share the observation.

In my comparison I only used statistics on venues with similar dates year over year, some did not run in 2011 or 2012 for weather related or other reasons.

So from the northern part of the Area 2, it looks like the schooling horse trials are picking up some of the entries at Beginner Novice. Some venues in Area 2 often run a schooling horse trial the day or week after their recognized ones, so why wouldn't riders sign up for a "similar" experience at half the price? If you have a youngster the schooling horse trial would be the more budget-friendly option, and the schooling horse trials provide mostly a comparable quality of product and are way more relaxed. Some of the organizers in Area 2 may complain about lower entries at the lower levels, but some may actually be part of the cause for this very reason. I guess I concluded that in our GMO area, both the schooling and recognized horse trials are going strong! Don't forget to support your area by lending a hand/volunteering when vou can.

Some of our GMO eventing members received special awards/placings in 2012! We would like to recognize and congratulate them!


But they keep doing it all. Just for you. Happy Valentine's Day!

2013 USEF/FEI EVENTING QUALIFYING REQUIREMENTS

The FEI Eventing Rules have been re-formatted and changed significantly for 2013. Foremost amongst the changes are those made to the FEI Minimum Eligibility Requirements (MERs) for horses and athletes.

In order to determine your eligibility at a certain level or that of your horse, we encourage you to follow these steps (we promise - it's easier than you think).

STEP I - CATEGORIZED OR UNCATEGORIZED? THAT IS THE QUESTION!

It is first important for you to determine whether you are, as an athlete, uncategorized or categorized (similar to a license) and, if you are categorized, at which level. This information will be updated by the FEI* at the end of each calendar year and can be found on the on the FEI website.

STEP 2 - USEF AND FEI, HOW CAN I BE SURE I HAVE COVERED ALL THE BASES?

Once you have determined your status with the FEI, please take the time to familiarize yourself with the 2013 Eventing Rules. Appendix 3 of the USEF Rules for Eventing will provide you with the specific information you need to determine the level of eligibility of you and your horse(s) for both National (USEF) and International (FEI) competitions.

USEF FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. The 2013 FEI Eventing Rules state: As of 2013, MERs for CIs and CIOs do not expire. Does this include MERs achieved prior to 2013 which were due to expire according to the 2012 FEI Eventing Rules?

Yes, with the exception of MERs required for the purposes of qualifying for FEI Championships, MERs achieved prior to 2013 remain valid for 2013 and beyond.

2. I am an uncategorized rider and prior to the end of 2012 my horse and I were qualified to enter a CIC 3* for the first time although we did not achieve all MERs as a combination. The 2013 FEI Eventing Rules state: "For Athletes not yet categorized at the level of the Competition the Minimum Eligibility Requirements must be achieved as a combination...." As we were qualified prior to 2013 do we remain qualified?

No, as of January 1, 2013 uncategorized riders must achieve all MERs required by the FEI for a particular level in combination with the horse they wish to compete in that level.

3. I am an uncategorized rider and established at the CCI3* level and I have a new horse who is established at the CCI 3* level. Under the new rules, am I required to move down and achieve all the FEI MERs to compete in a CCI 3* with my new horse?

Yes, you must achieve all FEI MER's required as a combination.

4. But, as an uncategorized rider, do I have to achieve National Qualifying Results (NQRs) required by the USEF in combination with each horse I wish to compete in FEI Competitions?

No, all USEF requirements DO NOT need to be achieved as a combination

5. I am listed on the FEI website as a Category B rider as I have achieved 15 FEI MERs at the three star level of competition over the last eight years. I understand that the number of FEI MERs required for categorization is 15 for 2013 and will increase to 20 in 2014. I am unable to achieve an additional 5 MERs at the same level or higher in 2013 will I lose my categorization at that level?

Yes, at the end of 2013 the FEI will update the list and only riders with 20 FEI MERs (or more) at a particular level will remain categorized at that level.

STILL NOT QUITE SURE?

If you still have questions about the FEI Minimum Eligibility Requirements or any of the recent changes to the FEI Eventing Rules, the FEI has created their own list of frequently asked questions which you may find helpful.

* For 2013 the FEI will update the list of categorized riders on or about July 1, 2013 to allow a one-time, mid-year opportunity for rider categories to be changed based on results achieved in the first six months of competition.

EDGAR HOTZ MEMORIAL ROUNDTABLE

On January 13, ESDCTA held its annual Edgar Hotz

Memorial Roundtable. The roundtable is open to all

USEF licensed dressage judges, USDF "L" program graduates, and candidates, as well as USEA licensed judges and judges in training. It was held, once again, at the home of Amelia and Larry Ross in Oldwick, NJ.

With 30 judges in attendance, the main topics of conversation were the new dressage rider's tests and Western dressage. Leading the discussion were key speaker Marilyn Payne and "S" dressage judges Barbara Ebner, Jeanne McDonald, Lisa Schmidt, Debby Savage, and Kem Barbosa.

Barbara Ebner introduced us all to the Western dressage tests, highlighting some minor differences in rules but stressing that gaits, movements, and transitions should be judged with primarily the same criteria as they are in traditional dressage tests. She brought along some video footage of her students riding some Western dressage tests and answered a variety of questions from floor.

Next, the discussion focused on the new rider's tests. Each test was discussed movement by movement with special attention given to the turn on the forehand which is not seen in any other USEF dressage test. Similar to the format used to judge the FEI Young Horse tests, the rider tests are not given a score for each movement, but rather given scores for overall impression in specific categories after the test has been ridden in its entirety. Marilyn voiced her concern that the guidelines for approximate time required for scheduling purposes may not be adequate since all of the scores need to be awarded after the final salute. She suggested that show organizers might want to allow a couple of extra minutes between the riders' tests to give the judges enough time to properly evaluate and score each test.

After a delicious pot-luck lunch, we spent the rest of the afternoon reviewing a variety of horses performing specific movements and discussing scores and comments.

Many thanks go out to all of the "S" judges in attendance as well as Amelia and Larry Ross, and ESDCTA for providing us with this invaluable opportunity.

We've all seen this (or similar) picture of George Washington on his white horse riding into battle:



But in actuality, the first president of our country had a number of horses throughout the war, the two most famous being Nelson (his main mount) and Blueskin (the white horse in most of the paintings). In fact, Washington was an avid horseman, with interests in breeding, racing, dressage, and hunting, as well as horse trading. He owned his first horse at age 17, and his mother, Mary Ball Washington, was a skilled horsewoman who taught her son how to train horses using gentle methods and to never resort to cruelty. When Washington was a 21-year-old diplomat, he had to make a harsh midwinter trip from Virginia to Erie, Pennsylvania. On the return trip, his horses were struggling with the deep snow and lack of fodder. Realizing this, instead of pushing them, Washington gave them to a tribe of local Indians, and he and his companions had to continue on foot. Later in his life, Washington once rode a Chincoteague pony named Chinky, 147 miles from Mount Vernon to Williamsburg in a single day. His favorite horse was the Arabian stallion, Magnolia, who he had purchased from his step-son, John Parke Custis, for 500 pounds after the British surrender at Yorktown. Magnolia was reputed as one of the most beautiful horses in the colonies. In 1788, he traded him to Light Horse Harry Lee for 5,000 acres of land in the Kentucky territory. When Washington died, he had 21 horses at his Mount Vernon estate.
