

A very important part of the meeting, particularly for GMO officers and committee chairs was the roundtable discussions offered during one workshop. The discussions provided an avenue for GMOs to share their successes regarding everything from education to membership. A grant writing round table discussion provided a complete rundown of opportunities from the Dressage Foundation and what is expected when a GMO decides to apply for a grant. The Foundation has funds for programs that could benefit ESDCTA, and we will be applying for some of these grants in 2012. Keep your finger crossed!

Both officers attended the Region 1 meetings. A survey of the region will be conducted to determine the feasibility of implementing an on-line Region 1 Omnibus for 2012 in lieu of the hard copy. The Potomac Valley Dressage Association (PVDA) has offered to host the 2012 Adult Team Competition, which will be July 7-8 at Prince George's Equestrian Center, and will be held in conjunction with its licensed show. Lastly, Anne Moss has offered to be the Region 1 Chef d'Equipe for the 2012 NAJYRC. Anne mentioned that she will be focusing her efforts this year to obtain sponsorship for new team equipment.

At the Youth Programs Committee the Dressage Seat Equitation (DSE) Program was discussed, including ways to increase participation. Attendees voiced their concern with class scheduling. People would like to see it scheduled during lunchtime rather than as the last class of the day/show. The length of the classes was thought to be too long, with 20 minutes as the maximal length of time suggested. It was brought up that many judges lack the knowledge to conduct a DSE class, and many judges do not want to judge this class, or are not comfortable with judging the class. In addition, establishing guidelines for borrowed horses to level the playing field at the Medal Finals was discussed. It is also important to know that a new FEI rule becomes effective in 2013: anyone under the age of 18, and/or riding a horse under the age of 7, competing in an FEI licensed competition (CDI) must wear a helmet when mounted.

"Getting the Uninvolved Involved" Roundtable discussion shared ideas about encouraging members to volunteer throughout the organization. The ideas ranged from a new volunteer medal program to saying thank you in a multitude of creative ways. Look for some new ways to inspire your volunteerism in 2012.

During the Competition Open Forum, concerns over the many different ways competitions are managing the helmet rule were discussed. The consensus was that there needs to be a standardized method. The use of half points began on December 1, 2011. It was stressed that judges should say "six point zero" for a score of 6, and scribes must record "6.0" on the test sheets. Scoring must turn back all tests that do not have the ".0" for full numbered scores. Competition managers noted that the change to half points nearly doubles the time it takes to score a test, so please be patient during next year's show season.

The USEF Proposed Rule Change Forum presented quite a few changes that will be up for vote at the January USEF Convention. They include a rewrite of GR1306, the amateur status rule to make it clearer. Whip length may now not exceed 100 cm in FEI Pony Classes. Bit rules are being revised to make them easier to understand and so there are fewer differences between FEI rules, national rules for FEI level classes, and national rules for classes below FEI levels.

Probably the most useful tool unveiled at the convention was USDF's GMO manual, which will provide Presidents everything they need to know about the larger organization, from services to forms. The manual will be available on a flash drive that allows for future updates. The manual is perfect for introducing new GMO presidents to the ins and outs of administrative tasks required by the position, as well as different programs and services that would benefit the GMO. It will provide a smooth transition from President to President-elect.

The Board of Governors Assemblies focused on a variety of topics, including the 2012 budget, but the hot topic was the creation of a Dressage National Championship. The USDF Board listened to many comments in response to this proposal before the final vote was taken and the proposal passed. While some believe that the undertaking might create fiscal and logistical issues, others supported the proposal with two main concerns: adding youth competitions to the list and postponing the start date of the competition until 2014 to give time for regional championship to make sure that they can get the appropriate dates for qualifying shows. Debbie spearheaded an effort for youth to participate while Susan supported the suggestion to move the inaugural competition to 2014. While neither was included in the final motion, the board assured the attendees that youth will eventually be included. They also said they did not believe the 2013 start date will hurt the regional competitions or the rest of GMOs' show schedules.

ESDCTA members were on hand to receive their national awards. This was indeed a highlight of the convention, as well as ESDCTA's acceptance of the GMO Newsletter Award for Best Original Article to Christina Wilson, DVM, and ESDCTA's Collective Remarks.

Incorporating "stress stoppers" and "precompetition rituals" into a routine will give the rider something positive to think about. He also discussed using "memory motivation" and performing "riding rehearsals" to increase a rider's chance of having a good ride. In the end, he mentioned that even if you use all of these tools, things can go wrong. So remember to LAUGH about it, LEARN from it, and continue to LOVE the sport.

After learning about sports psychology, it was off to an open forum on rule changes. There was not a whole lot of noteworthy rule changing in the sport of eventing; however, there are a few changes that riders should be aware of. The five-second penalty for riders who cross the start line before the 10-second count down is completed has been removed. Starters will just record their start time when they cross over the line. Authorized assistance will now include handing back a whip; in the old rule it was only headgear and spectacles (yes, that shows how old that rule really is). Show jump obstacles must now have a timber core which will prevent the use of hollow PVC rails used as the top rail on fences. Show organizers will have the option to split the Intermediate or Advanced divisions if the rider list is over 40 people. This was a rule brought up by the Professional Riders Organization (PRO) because professional riders would rather have the divisions left as one instead of being divided to give a true representation of a rider's ability compared to his/her peers. Finally, the most controversial rule change involves the "One Fall and Out" rule when falls are related to the XC fence; they are changing this to allow Training level and below to remount in a given amount of time if the horse has not left control of the rider (ie, galloped all the way back to the trailer). The number of associated penalties was proposed at 65; however there is some discussion on this before it goes into print.

Another seminar I attended was "Training Solutions from Top Event Riders". The panel included Karen O'Connor, Boyd Martin, Phillip Dutton, Leslie Law, Clayton Fredericks, and Buck Davidson. They opened the session with questions from the floor and took turns answering. Questions covered a range of topics from equipment, training young horses, getting rid of bad habits, and conditioning techniques for upper level competitions. "The Latest in Eventing Safety" was another great session that presented the recent research on helmets and body protectors, including the new air vests. It was very interesting to hear about the techniques used to test these products and how they have to design them to make them safe for equestrians versus other sports like football, biking, and motor cross. The speaker, David Halstead, from the University of Tennessee, mentioned that football players are great subjects to study because they intentionally go around hitting their heads. This whole safety session was worthwhile because it allowed me to at least try out one of the Point Two air vests. Their latest product is a body protector and combination air vest. After demonstrating the vest for the first time and getting the initial shock of the CO2 cartridge pop and the subsequent blowing up of the vest, the company asked me if I would be in a safety video for the Riders4Helmets helmet and riding safety campaign. So I have my 60 seconds of fame on their website: www.riders4helmets.com, check it out to see their newest products. I think I know what I am asking Santa for this year!

The final business meeting and luncheon was a real treat, we got to listen to Australian four-star eventer, Clayton Fredericks, as the keynote speaker! Fredericks is based in England with his wife Lucinda, and they run Team Fredericks. He took us through his progression into stardom with his wife, and also gave us some tidbits we didn't know…like that he is the lead singer of a rock band called Snatch! We even got to listen to one of his hits. Overall the convention was a great learning experience and hopefully I was able to bring back some good information for you and for the ESDCTA's Eventing Committee from the Eventing Affiliates portion of the meeting. Next year it is off to Colorado Springs!

DIRECTIONS FROM FLEMINGTON CIRCLE:

South on Route 202/31 South. About 3.5 miles from the circle, you will pass Stewart's Root Beer on the right hand side. Copper Hill Road is the second right past Stewart's. Before the traffic light, you will see a sign "Copper Hill Road Keep Right". Veer off onto the jug handle, turn right at the yield sign and follow down the hill. You will see the Clubhouse on your right hand side. To get to the parking lot, go half way around the circle and turn right at the stop sign.

From South Jersey: - Routes 295, 195, or 95 to Route 31 North. Stay on 31 North until it joins with 202 North. Exit onto 202/31 North. Follow approximately 3 miles to light at Copper Hill Road. Insights from the Linda Zang Education Seminar: Mastering Straightness and Bending By Molly Moon

"The highest goal ... isn't simply to win, it's to become the best at something that's really difficult; it's to reach beyond your level of ability and come out on top." James Watson (Nobel Prize for the discovery of the structure of DNA)

I would go to a seminar to hear Linda Zang explain how to do just about anything – even how to muck a stall or pick out a hoof – be-cause I consider her to be a role model for her professional expertise, as well as her communication skills. Yes, she has been formally recognized for her expertise in judging dressage by the USDF, FEI, and organizing committees of the Olympics, World Cup, and World Equestrian Games. And yes, she is a confident, articulate, effective leader and career woman, but no, there is no arrogance about yesterday's accomplishments, only a focus on today and tomorrow.

On December 3, 2011, Linda helped to improve the training of dressage and event horses and riders from ESDCTA. It was a master class for dressage training and a lesson in communicating with and teaching adult students.

Straightness was one of the major themes of Linda's seminar. A horse must be straight – its shoulders moving in front of its quarters – in order to move forward with correct contact, activity,

expression, and, when appropriate, collect and ex-tend. A rider must be straight – position their shoulders above their hips – in order to control their aids and the distribution of their weight, straighten their horse, and train it to move with straightness. Linda worked on improving straightness in a variety of horses and riders.

She told the audience that many horses are crooked. They may avoid contact or resist by "falling" onto their outside shoulder, tilting their head, or stiffening in their poll or in front of their withers. Linda's general approach was to first ride the horse forward with energy to bring the horse "up," and second, to relax the horse's stiff or braced muscles. Relaxing the poll is very important because it teaches a horse to work from the rider's inside leg to their outside rein. It also helps a horse learn to straighten itself and freely use its back, shoulders, and quarters. Some quick tips:

- Remember that "inside" is the side to which the horse is bent around the rider's inside leg, regardless of whether the horse is going clockwise or counterclockwise around the ring.
- Use your "inside" aids to supple and relax the horse. Use your "outside" aids to hold the horse "straight" and (when appropriate) to collect your horse.
- To bend or flex a horse, use your "opening inside rein" by keeping your inside hand low and moving it away from the horse's neck, similar to opening a door. Don't pull the reins. Sit "over" your inside leg and keep your thighs and knees "open" (don't squeeze). Sit back and keep a gap open between your upper body and your hands to allow the horse's back to swing as he moves forward with more power. It also helps develop the medium and extended gaits.
- Ride the horse with your "core" as much as possible. When bending your horse or riding a half-halt, sit up and lift your inside shoulder and rib cage while keeping your inside hip forward, shift your weight on your inside seat bone, and step down through your inside knee into your inside stirrup. At the same time, keep your outside shoulder back and over your outside hip, and your outside hand low and steady.
- Flex and bend a horse to "unlock" resistance. Drive forward to bring the horse "up" and increase power of forward movement. If the horse stiffens, flex and bend to relax. If the horse "falls" through one rein onto their shoulder, one approach is to tap the horse on the shoulder with a whip. Another approach is to ride a smaller circle or a turn on the forehand, and use the inside leg to drive the horse forward and into contact with the reins.
- In general, start to do bending and suppling work while riding on a 20-meter circle. As the horse advances in training, do this work on smaller circles, on lines, and before asking for lateral movements.
