

Last month we introduced the new Adult Amateur Sweepstakes as a part of the CDI 1\* at the Memorial Weekend Show. Let's hope that many of our FEI level Adult Amateur competitors take advantage of the opportunity to share in the Sweepstakes while sharing in the excitement of participating in a CDI.

Entering a CDI 1\* is much less complicated and expensive than entering a 3\* but you do need to get your registration papers in order. Here are some of the things you'll need to know.

Complete the required applications. They're quick, easy, and inexpensive.

- FEI Rider Registration: www.usef.org/documents/membership/2013/FEIRiderReg.pdf cost \$15
- FEI Horse Registration: www.usef.org/documents/membership/2013/FEIHorsReg.pdf cost \$15
- USEF National Passport: www.usef.org/documents/international/natpass.pdf cost \$50

You should also take advantage of the extensive information available from the FEI on their very informative websites. All the information you ever wanted to know and much more can be found at www.FEI.org/disciplines/dressage/rules for complete dressage rules/movements/ saddlery & dress etc.

Information on veterinary inspections, required equine influenza vaccination and health requirements, doping and controlled medications and much more can be found at: www.fei.org/ veterinary/vaccinations-and-health-requirements

So fill out your registration forms – takes only 5 minutes and get your vet started with the equine influenza vaccinations and we'll see you on Thursday, May 23, 2013. There will be a vet inspection and you'll get yourself settled in for the show.


Then all you have to do is get yourself all prettied up for the jog and the CDI reception that follows. This is your chance to schmooze and have fun.

One last thing to remember, you can enter the CDI 1\* and just do the PSG class. You don't have to ride either the I-1 or the I-1 MFS if those levels aren't yet part of your repertoire. After your ride your CDI PSG class on Friday you can enter open classes for the rest of the weekend.



## SALUTE...

Like most girls, Lori grew up a horse crazy kid. She didn't have the resources to provide herself with a horse or lessons, so Lori rode rental horses, catch rides and worked at barns in exchange for riding until she was a teenager. Although she never stopped her love for horses, she had to stop riding for a long time. Once she got married in 1997, Lori started up lessons again, leased a school horse which led to her first horse. She then bought her horse, Probably Not, aka Knot.

Currently, Lori trains with Lisa Lewis-Greene at Keneva farm in Mullica Hill, NJ. In 2009, Lori began working with Lisa regularly and she has made such a difference to both her riding and training. Lori has competed in recognized shows since 2009 but has competed in schooling shows before then. She began dressage after one too many falls in eventing. She realized she had to focus on flat work and ended up hooked to dressage. Although she no longer events, Lori is so glad she had as she has so many fun memories from eventing!

Lori really enjoys dressage because you never stop earning. Once you think you've learned something, there's always much more to learn and on how to do it better. Often Lori tells her non-horse friends that dressage is like golf. "You can never ever be perfect. You keep taking lessons to learn better approaches. It's a lifetime of learning something that always has room for improvement and education." Dressage has also helped Knot greatly and his overall health, fitness and appearance are amazing even with turning 21 come May! Lori uses competing as a way to get a quick assessment from a judge as to if they are competing at an appropriate level and also to see what it takes to move up to the next level.

Lori has owned Knot for the past twelve years. Knot is a 15.1 hand bay breeding stock paint- not a traditional breed! Breeding stock paint registry means that he has no white spots to qualify him to be registered into the regular APHA registry. Although he isn't a typical "dressage horse", when under saddle he looks just like a cute little Warmblood! He is also always a barn favorite with his mind and gentle nature! Knot was bred for his mind before anything else and his mind is definitely amazing.


Since 2009, Lori and Knot have had many successes. In 2009, the pair won ESDCTA Championships at Training Level and were Reserve Champion for USDF All Breeds – open. The pair was Champion at the ESDCTA Championships at First Level in 2010 along with placing third for USDF All Breeds –open. 2011 was a great season for the pair as they were Second Level Champion for ECRDA Year End and Open Champion for USDF All Breeds. This past season, They were Reserve Champion for Second Level USDF All Breeds and earned an ESDCTA Achievement Ribbon at Third Level! They have also earned both rider and horse USDF Performance Certificates at Training, First, and Second Levels! Eventually, Lori hopes to earn her USDF Bronze Medal in the future, although she wouldn't be disappointed if it wasn't earned on Knot as he owes her nothing!

Aside from riding, Lori is a complete bookworm! She also enjoys running and racing! Lori and her husband, Gary, have been married for 16 years and although not a horse person himself, Gary supports Lori 100%! He never resents the amount of time or money horses require and is always a great support!

Lori would like to make a point to everyone reading that everyone CAN do it! "With enough determination and dedication, anyone on any horse can do this. I strongly want everyone to know you don't need a big expensive Warmblood or a pro riding your horse three times a week to have success and fun in the show ring." Lori knows her advice to be true from her own first hand experiences in the sport!

### **TEAM SELECTION DEADLINES RIGHT AROUND THE CORNER!**

It's time to start thinking about representing the ESDCTA in team competitions. Last year our selected team members were very successful, had a great time working as members of a team, and learned a lot. Everyone went away with a positive experience.

This year we are sending teams to compete at Lendon Gray's Youth Dressage Festival (July 12-14), the USDF Region 1 Youth Dressage Team Competition (July 27-28), the Millbrook Horse Trials Team Competition (August 1-4), and the Team Challenge at Burgundy Hollow Horse Trials (Oct. 27).

If you are accepted as a member of a team, ESDCTA pays your entry fees (for team classes/divisions) and stabling fees.

Team applications are available on the ESDCTA website: esdcta.org. All applicants must have 8 volunteer hours and have met the criteria outlined in the ESDCTA Omnibus. If you have any questions, do not hesitate to contact one of the youth co-chairs.

### YOUTH EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

#### **Fix-a-Test Clinics**

To help you get ready for the show season, we are offering three fix-a-test clinics around our membership area. At a fix-a-test clinic, the participant rides the dressage test of his/ her choice, and a judge scores it just like at a horse show. The judge will then work with the rider to improve upon the test, and the rider can then ride the test again. The rider will receive a copy of both of their tests. This format is a great way to learn how to improve your scores and to hear and see how a judge arrives at a score for each movement. We also have an hour lunch discussion with the judge clinician. We encourage all youth to attend as riders or auditors and to plan to audit the entire day. Participants and all-day auditors will receive 10 credits towards the Youth Educational Award.

## A Day of Wisdom with Tik Maynard

On December 16, RainbowRidge Equestrian Center in Flemington, NJ, hosted a clinic by Tik Maynard focused on enhancing partnerships with the performance horse. Tik, who is head trainer at Bow Brickhill Stables, has worked in almost all sport horse disciplines, is an Equine Canada certified instructor, and was long-listed for the 2012 Olympic Games in Eventing for Canada. I think Tik had as much fun as those of us participating because from the first horse to the last (almost 8 hours later) he gave his all with a smile on his face, even if that meant having the patience to teach a skittish horse to walk on a tarp or having to deal with an exuberant yearling.



My horse, PJ, and I were his first victims of the day. I explained that my issue was that when I ride I feel that 50% of PJ's attention is on me and the other 50% is on his environment, which I thought contributed to PJ's lack of reactiveness

to my aids (he's a slug). Tik started out by putting PJ in a rope halter with a long lead (I hesitate to call it a lunge line) attached. He then asked PJ to walk off like he was being lunged using just a point of his finger in the direction he wanted PJ to go. Of course, PJ didn't know what he wanted, so Tik adjusted his body position and shook the whip a little, which PJ did understand. Once PJ took a step in the right direction, Tik immediately relaxed and stopped asking anything. PJ stopped and Tik rubbed his face. Tik remarked that breaks are where the real learning takes place. Eventually he had PJ walking and trotting in both directions, as well as backing up and coming towards him with no pull on the lead – just a gesture with his hand one way or the other. Then he had me try, which



didn't go quite as smoothly but I got the idea, which was to get PJ to focus on me and to react to subtle aids just like I wanted him to under saddle. I could see how this could be very valuable at a horse show when PJ was even more distracted.

A lot was going on outside the indoor and when Tik got on PJ, he wanted to spook. Tik explained that instead of focusing on what the horse wanted to look at, the rider should just continue with whatever he/she had planned, and importantly, the rider should always have a plan. Even if the plan was as simple as a 20-meter circle, the rider shouldn't be wishy-washy in his/her request. He had me get on next and concentrate on controlling PJ's speed and direction; if I accomplished that, PJ would see me as his leader because I controlled his feet, and he would shift his focus from his environment to me. We ended without a single spook.

The next two people had very different horses. One was skittish and the other was too laid back. Tik explained that you can't change a horse's nature but you

can improve him, meaning the skittish horse will never become a deadhead and the dull horse will never be flighty, but you could get the skittish horse to become calm and the dull horse to become responsive. Using the rope halter and lead with the skittish horse, Tik swung the lead rope around, which at first startled him. Once he relaxed, Tik stopped swinging the lead (giving him a break). He said that there were times to sensitize a horse and times to desensitize a horse. What he had done with PJ moving in a circle was a form of sensitizing, while what he did by swinging the lead around and not asking for anything was desensitizing.

Tik started every horse with groundwork using the rope halter and lead rope. With some horses, he rode using the rope halter and

lead instead of a bridle and bit. He explained that by not having a bit, what he was asking the horse was very black and white; he just wanted the horse to go a certain speed and in a certain direction without the complication of "going on the bit". He also pulled out a tarp, barrels, and a jump with the purpose of getting the horses to learn to learn. He used the horse's natural curiosity to eventually allow him to put a tarp over a horse's head or just have a horse calmly walk between two barrels.

What Tik told us was nothing new, but he was able to put classic principles into a novel and engaging context, finding new metaphors that he was able to demonstrate with our own horses. What I liked most was that he recognized that our horses were being used in sport. The end goal was not to get our horses to allow us to stand on their backs, per se, but to trust us, to enjoy learning new things, and eventually for us to be able to ride a better dressage test or have a better crosscountry run.
