

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

Smile! Your Horses Teeth Need Your Attention

Dental care is essential for the comfort and health of a horse. Over the years we have domesticated horses and altered their natural diets, and ask them to do work from a young age. Most horses have all of their permanent teeth by age five. Horse teeth are hypsodont, meaning they continue to erupt throughout the horse's life. Routine exams, maintenance, and correction of any dental issues can improve a horse's condition and future health. Mature horses should be examined once a year while younger and geriatric horses should be examined twice a year. It is often difficult to recognize dental disease without a thorough oral exam. Some horses show obvious signs of pain while others are very good at adapting to the discomfort caused by dental problems.

Some indications of problems:

- Dropping grain or wadding hay
- Loss of body condition
- Undigested feed particles in manure
- Resisting the bit or poor performance under saddle
- Foul odor from mouth/nose or nasal discharge

The most common dental problems:

- Sharp enamel points, causing ulcerations of cheek and tongue
- Retained caps (deciduous teeth that are not shed)
- Wolf teeth interfering with the bit
- Hooks on the upper and lower cheek teeth
- Periodontal disease





Unresolved dental issues can lead to a number of serious consequences such as colic, choke, sinus infections, and fractured teeth, just to name a few. Preventative maintenance includes a thorough oral exam with a dental speculum and dental equilibration (floating). Floating removes the sharp enamel points and hooks on cheek teeth to improve the comfort and allow the horse to grind more efficiently. Due to the anatomy of the horses mouth, points are typically found on the outside (buccal or cheek) surface of the upper cheek teeth and the inside (labial or tongue) surface of the lower cheek teeth. Horses chew in a circular motion and misaligned teeth can lead to hooks on the front and back cheek teeth.

Depending on the condition of your horse's teeth, multiple visits may be necessary to correct the problems. Sedation and local anesthetics can be used to increase comfort and cooperation while the dental procedures are being performed. It is important to catch dental problems early because as the abnormalities progress, treatment becomes more challenging. At minimum, annual oral exams by your veterinarian, along with routine dental equilibration will improve the health and performance of your horse despite the age and activity level.

Meet ESDCTA youth member and eventer, Kaleigh Quinn!



Kaleigh, age 18, hails from Port Jervis, NY, and has been riding since she was 11 starting off in the hunter/jumper disciplines. At 13, she began working with a trainer who was an eventer She was "hooked" and started to event at the Beginner Novice Level.

A dedicated rider, Kaleigh trains 5-6 days a week, including a weekly lesson with her trainer, Linett Tell of Windswept Farms in Augusta, NJ, who she has worked with since she was 13. This year will be Kaleigh s second year competing at the Preliminary level with her mount Toy Story, a 15.2 chestnut Irish Sport Horse gelding she has had since she was 16, and hopes to run Intermediate during this season. Kaleigh has also recently begun working with Sinead Halpin twice each month to prepare her to move up to Inter-

mediate. Cross country is Kaleigh's favorite phase in eventing. Among Kaleigh's many accomplishments, she recently earned the USEA Bronze Medal at the Preliminary level. When asked what were her longer term riding goals she replied, "NJ Fresh, Rolex, and the Olympics —isn t that every young eventer's dream?"

A student at Port Jervis High School, Kaleigh is equally committed to her education, taking AP classes this year as she prepares for college. Kaleigh will be attending Quinnipiac University in CT, this fall to pursue a degree in athletic training/sports medicine with the long term goal of earning her doctorate and becoming a physical therapist. She does not plan to bring her horse to college but fortunately she will be only a few hours away from home. "Horses will always be a part of my life and I plan to continue to compete for as long as I can

Kaleigh joined the Autumn Ridge Pony Club about the same time she started to ride and has progressed through the ratings, earning her B last year. Kaleigh was recently appointed the New Jersey Region's delegate to the USPC National Youth Board, a program created by the USPC Board of Governors to bring together outstanding older pony club members that have been recognized for their leadership at the local and regional levels. The leadership program held at the UPSC annual convention in Nashville, TN, this year "was a great learning experience" for Kaleigh where she had the "opportunity to meet and share all kinds of experiences with other pony clubbers from all over the country—as well as meet USPC alumni who were receiving this year's Academy of Achievement Awards.

When asked what eventer she admired the most Kaleigh replied, "Karen O'Connor – she's done it all, she is living every young eventer's dream!" Kaleigh's advice to younger riders is, "don't get discouraged; mistakes happen and you learn from them. Everyone has their good and bad days."

This is a very exciting time in Kaliegh's life. By the time you read this feature, Kaleigh will have flown to CA, where she will meet the rest of the USPC team that has been chosen for the 2-week 2011 Inter Pacific Exchange Program in New Zealand! A true cultural, educational, and competitive experience, team members travel throughout New

Zealand living with host families and competing in a one-day event and a Nation s Cup Show Jumping competition with teams from Japan, Hong Kong, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand. Kaleigh promises to write an article about her experiences upon her return home.

ESDCTA Trainers 'Tips, Advice and Observations

Back to "School"

The starter calls out, "... 30 seconds 15 seconds..... and the countdown begins. Ten... nine... eight... seven... six... five... four... three... two... one. Mouth dry and heart pounding you leave the start box to conquer your first cross-country course of the season! Whether you are an experienced professional or green to eventing, you still must tackle the extra nerves and excitement that come with the first event of the season. Thorough preparation is the best way for both horse and rider to combat these nerves. Eventers can accomplish this goal by making the most out of early cross-country schooling opportunities.

First on the to do list is fitness for both horse and rider. We all know how difficult it is to keep both us and our equine partners fit when the winter weather only permits riding around in circles in an indoor arena trying not to get frostbite. Unfortunately this is often all the weather allows us to accomplish, and it prevents horse and rider from preparing to attack a cross-country course. But all is not lost as

spring and good weather eventually do arrive. My advice: as soon as the weather breaks, get out of the ring. Go on hacks with lots of slow trotting and cantering. You can even practice some of the trot sets in two-point, which helps your fitness and balance. Don't be surprised at how much you feel the burn in your thighs and calves after your long winter break. Don't let this stop you; keep it up. Hopefully all of the fitness work will help reduce the need for an oxygen mask half way through the first schooling!

Next on the cross country to do list is completing a cross-country school. Once you feel ready to get out on an actual course try to make arrangements with your regular coach or a supportive ground person. Schooling in a small group is nice for the camaraderie and support. Whether it is cheering each other on or bargaining for who is going to jump the scary course first, it helps to have the support of other riders. Chances are you will not feel as brave as you did at the end of the previous season. This is natural, so make sure not to over face yourself as you pick up the reins again. Start by selecting a few small fences and repeat them in a pattern at a comfortable canter until getting into a rhythm. Schooling fences in groups rather than single fences is my personal preference. Gradually build up to more challenging courses of fences, eventually including the bank, water, or the dreaded ditch! Just remember to stop before either horse or rider gets too tired.

Of course next on the to-do list is to realistically reflect on your schooling. After giving you equine partner lots of carrots for a job well done it is time to evaluate your performance and make a plan. If you or your horse were not able to settle and control those nerves, try to schedule a couple more cross-country schools before your first event. Better to take the time and feel completely confident, or even over prepared, rather than hoping it will magically come together at the event. Any experienced rider will tell you that if you cannot do something at home, it will not happen at an event.

Now, schoolings have been successful, both horse and rider are prepared, show day has arrived, the countdown begins, and you are off... Before you know it you hear the "beep, beep, beep" of your cross country watch just after you cross over the finish line. Hopefully all went well, and you think, "That was fun, when can I do it again?" Enjoy the elation. Both horse and rider were well prepared. Job well done.

- The 2011 Region 1 Youth Competition will be held at Morven Park on July 23-24, 2011, and hosted by VADA/NOVA. Alison Head reported on plans for the show. GMOS are encouraged to help with the cost and volunteers.
- The 2011 NAJYRC will take place in Lexington Kentucky on July 26-Aug7, 2011. The finances of the NAJYRC account were discussed. Debbie and Nicole DelGiorno discussed possible fundraising activities to help the Region 1 teams.

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
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
